St. Margaret Mary Alacoque is the patron saint of devotees of the Sacred Heart, and those suffering with polio and from the loss of parents. Her feast day is celebrated on October 16. St. Margaret Mary Alacoque, a French Roman Catholic Visitation nun and mystic, is greatly recognized for her devotion to the Sacred Heart of Jesus.

St. Margaret Mary was chosen by Christ to arouse the Church to a realization of the love of God symbolized by the heart of Jesus. Her early years were marked by sickness and a painful home situation. "The heaviest of my crosses was that I could do nothing to lighten the cross my mother was suffering."

St. Teresa of Ávila was a Spanish Carmelite nun who lived in the 1500s. She was a mystic and author of spiritual writings and poems. She founded numerous convents throughout Spain and was the originator of the Carmelite Reform that restored a contemplative and austere life to the order.

St. Teresa of Avila spent a great deal of time in solitude contemplating in the name of God. As an author, she is considered one of the foremost writers on mental prayer, a form of prayer whereby one loves God through dialogue and meditating on God's words.

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Life of Charity, The Way of The Disciple

There are mixed up or unclearness in the term "Messiah" as "the Anointed One." Most of the Jews thought of him as a powerful, conquering leader who would set his people free from their oppressors, the way James and John perceived what the Lord was that they asked him for a throne on His left and right when He fulfills all the messianic task on earth. A small minority, instead, believed on the idea that the Messiah would save his people by taking upon himself the enslavement of sin which oppressed them and all mankind, in many ways the Lord was, but not losing His innocence and his faultlessness. The Messiah portrayed through dramatic scenes in the four Isaiah passages known as "The Songs of the Servant of the Lord." The idea of glory and triumph is also included in the fourth Song, but His comes only at the end, and after the cruel suffering humbly endured by Him in atonement for the sins of all mankind, a scripture that is unclear and even hard to accept except for Christ Himself. This Sunday, Jesus demonstrates the three marks of discipleship, not rooted in association, but by service. First, the openness of oneself in fulfilling the master's will. Second is willingness of the disciple not to gain reward from the master, but to take joy in serving others the way the master had demonstrates. The third is to obey the master in his command. The disciple is worthless if he doesn't know the will of his master. We are challenged by the readings of this Sunday to take up the cause of discipleship in Jesus, not counting the cost, but delighting to be identified belonging to Him. *Fr. Norlito*
