


The Desert Fathers

APRIL 17, 2022

The **Desert Fathers** or **Desert Monks** were early Christian hermits and ascetics, who lived mainly in the Scetes desert of the Roman province of Egypt, beginning around the third century AD. The most well-known was Anthony the Great, who moved to the desert in AD 270–271 and became known as both the father and founder of desert monasticism. By the time Anthony had died in AD 356, thousands of monks and nuns had been drawn to living in the desert following Anthony's example. These men and women who have chosen to live the solitary life

enriched the church of their wisdom, writings, and prayers. Unknown now to many, and only practiced by contemplative communities, the Dessert Fathers and Mothers were also celebrated a day after Easter, for just like Jesus who went into seclusion for forty days and nights to fast and be tempted by the devil, the Dessert Fathers and Mothers likewise encountered the dark forces of the enemy in the wilderness but overcome it all through the power of prayer and contemplation.
