

St. Hildegard of Bingen, OSB

Holy Virgin, Doctor of The Church, musician, mathematician, herbalist, moralist, mystic, and polymath. A woman of many talents and educations in an era where we ignorantly labeled as an age of "darkness in history." She is a testament to genius of the Catholic Mind, and intellectual giant in history.

Born into a noble family, she was instructed for ten years by the holy woman Blessed Jutta. When Hildegard was 18, she became a Benedictine nun at the Monastery of Saint Disibodenberg. Ordered by her confessor to write down the visions that she had received since the age of three, Hildegard took ten years to write her *Scivias* (*Know the Ways*). Pope Eugene III read it, and in 1147, encouraged her to continue writing. Her *Book of the Merits of Life* and *Book of Divine Works* followed. She wrote over 300 letters to people who sought her advice; she also composed short works on medicine and physiology, and sought advice from contemporaries such as Saint Bernard of Clairvaux.

Hildegard's visions caused her to see humans as "living sparks" of God's love, coming from God as daylight comes from the sun. Sin destroyed the original harmony of creation; Christ's redeeming death and resurrection opened up new possibilities. Virtuous living reduces the estrangement from God and others that sin causes. Like all mystics, Hildegard saw the harmony of God's creation and the place of women and men in that. This unity was not apparent to many of her contemporaries. Hildegard was no stranger to controversy. The monks near her original foundation protested vigorously when she moved her monastery to Bingen, overlooking the Rhine River. She confronted Emperor Frederick Barbarossa for supporting at least three antipopes. Hildegard challenged the Cathars, who rejected the Catholic Church claiming to follow a more pure Christianity.

Between 1152 and 1162, Hildegard often preached in the Rhineland. Her monastery was placed under interdict because she had permitted the burial of a young man who had been excommunicated. She insisted that he had been reconciled with the Church and had received its sacraments before dying. Hildegard protested bitterly when the local bishop forbade the celebration of reception of the Eucharist at the Bingen monastery, a sanction that was lifted only a few months before her death. In 2012, Hildegard was canonized and named a Doctor of the Church by Pope Benedict XVI. Her liturgical feast is celebrated on September 17.

Ponticianus, a close friend of St. Augustine was the first one to break away from the heretical gang of St. Augustine and went to join the community of St. Anthony of Egypt in the dessert of Northern Africa. Learning of the dangers that Augustine may bring to the church, he visited Augustine and pleaded to hear what he wanted to say, but unknowing that Augustine and his friend were already a catechumens under the direction of St. Ambrose. Augustine was so delighted seeing his long-lost friend and hearing about the life of these "Holy Fools" who abandoned all and retreated to the wilderness to dedicate themselves in contemplation and prayer. Later, Augustine will create his own band of "Holy Fools," men and women who are not deprived of the necessities, but rather should live a life of poverty, chastity, and obedience according to Divine Justice and Charity.

We are all Anawim or Holy Fools for Jesus, not because we are experiencing some form of deprivation or lacking of things that the world views as riches. We are all poor in the spirit because we rely only on Jesus, we recognize the source of our joys and consolation. We acknowledge that God is the source of our blessings, and it is fitting to give God praises and thanksgiving because of His providence. Let the world see us as "Holy Fools" for Jesus and allow Him to fill us with his riches. Riches that the world cannot gain.
