In his final public speech on Easter Sunday, Pope Francis delivered a message of hope and unity amidst global challenges, urging people to revive trust in others and cherish the value of each human life. His words also touched upon the importance of overcoming violence and promoting a culture of mercy and compassion.

Key points from Pope Francis's final inspirational quotes:

Urging Hope and Trust:

Called for renewed hope and trust in others, particularly those who are different or from distant lands, emphasizing the importance of understanding and respect.

Condemning Violence:

Condemned the violence witnessed worldwide, including violence within families and towards vulnerable populations, highlighting the need to combat cruelty and promote a culture of peace.

Promoting Mercy:

Urged people to never tire of being merciful, emphasizing the importance of compassion and understanding for all.

Value of Human Life:

Reaffirms the inestimable value of every human life, calling for solidarity and love for the global family.

Overcoming Evil with Good:

Encouraged people to be the first to bring good and to defeat evil with good,

reminding them that situations and individuals can change.

Holiness in Ordinary Life:

States that holiness is not about extraordinary feats, but about doing ordinary things with love and faith.

The Power of Change:


Emphasized the importance of being adaptable and open to change in order to adapt to different situations and effectively proclaim the Gospel.

Not Being Afraid to Dream Big:

Encouraged people to not be afraid to dream big and to strive for a better future.

Importance of the Church:



Second Collection

Saturday, April 26 - Sunday, April 27

Our 2nd collection this weekend (April 26-27) will be taken up for the Joseph Dutton Guild.

Joseph Dutton's cause for canonization is our collective mission and together, we have the privilege of bring-

ing to light the saintly witness of one of our own.

Let's take up this cause as a community of faith and help share his inspiring legacy with the world.

Joseph Dutton was born **Ira Barnes Dutton** in Stowe, Vermont, son of Ezra Dutton and Abigail Barnes. Dutton carried out his studies at Old Academy and Milton Academy, Wisconsin and in 1861 enlisted in 13th Wisconsin Infantry under Colonel Maurice Malooney. He was a quartermaster in the 13th Wisconsin Volunteer Infantry Regiment during the American Civil War. He had been raised Protestant in Baptist Sunday schools and was for a time married. The marriage did not last as his wife (who he never mentioned by name) was unfaithful and Dutton developed problems with alcohol. He quit drinking in 1876 and later took the name Joseph.

He converted to Catholicism in 1883 and afterward spent 20 months at the Abbey of Our Lady of Gethsemani. In 1886 Dutton went to Molokai to aid the dying Father Damien, who was grateful for his assistance. Dutton remembered that he told Father Damien "My name is Joseph Dutton; I've come to help, and I've come to stay" upon meeting him—and he did stay, for the remainder of his life. After Father Damien's death Dutton founded the Baldwin Home for men and boys with financial assistance from Henry Perrine Baldwin.

Dutton was a member of the Secular Franciscan Order. He was often called "Brother Joseph."

Dutton wrote the article "Molokai" for the *Catholic Encyclopedia*, and composed and sent many letters detailing life on the island, and U. S. President Theodore Roosevelt was one of those who read of his service to the ailing. He was so impressed by the veteran's work that he ordered the United States Navy's Great White Fleet to pay tribute to him by dipping their flags as they passed by the island.

Dutton died in Honolulu on March 26, 1931. He was buried at St. Philomena Catholic Church Cemetery, Kalaupapa. In 2015, the Diocese of Honolulu set up a committee to evaluate the possibility of canonization. In December 2015, the Joseph Dutton Guild was established by the Diocese of Honolulu to petition the Diocese of Honolulu to start the formal cause of beatification and canonization. At the present, the Guild is in the process of collecting evidence to ascertain whether a petition for a formal cause is feasible.

St. Joseph, the Worker

Behold, the angel of the Lord appeared to him in a dream and said, "Joseph, son of David, do not be afraid to take Mary your wife into your home. For it is through the holy Spirit that this child has been conceived in her. She will bear a son and you are to name him Jesus." Matthew 1:20–21a



God, the true father of Jesus, desired to have an earthly father for his Son as well. God chose a gentle, quiet, and humble man named Joseph, a carpenter from Nazareth, who was actually already betrothed to Mary. When Joseph discovered that Mary was with child before he had brought her into his home, he was stunned. He agonized over what to do. He wondered how he could marry her when he knew the child was not his. Because of his caring and righteous nature, he decided he would divorce her quietly in order to avoid humiliating her publicly. However, in a dream, an angel told Joseph to not worry, that the child was conceived by the Holy Spirit, and that Joseph was needed to be the foster father of the baby. Joseph immediately canceled his plans of divorce and took Mary into his home.

Other examples exist in the New Testament that show evidence of Joseph's calm, considerate, and God-fearing nature, including:

Joseph carefully taking Mary to Bethlehem when a census was ordered. Being devotedly at Mary's and Jesus' side during the visits of the shepherds and Magi.

Being pensive and no doubt an amazed witness when Jesus was presented to Simeon and Anna at the Temple.

Unquestioningly paying heed to more dreams from the angel of the Lord, cautiously taking Mary and the baby Jesus to Egypt to escape the wrath of Herod and then returning to Nazareth when it was safe.

Finally—and this is the last mention of Joseph—anxiously helping Mary search for Jesus for three days in the hectic city of Jerusalem.

Joseph's nature offers inspiration for a strong, quiet confidence in the Lord. There is never a sense of chaos or disarray about him. Even when he didn't understand and things seemed illogical, he completely trusted and let God guide him.
