

The Story of the Seven Founders of the Servite Order

Can you imagine seven prominent men of Boston or Denver banding together, leaving their homes and professions, and going into solitude for a life directly given to God? That is what happened in the cultured and prosperous city of Florence in the middle of the 13th century. The city was torn with political strife as well as the heresy of the Cathari, who believed that physical reality was inherently evil. Morals were low and religion seemed meaningless.


In 1240, seven noblemen of Florence mutually decided to withdraw from the city to a solitary place for prayer and direct service of God. Their initial difficulty was providing for their dependents, since two were still married and two were widowers.

Their aim was to lead a life of penance and prayer, but they soon found themselves disturbed by constant visitors from Florence. They next withdrew to the deserted slopes of Monte Senario.

In 1244, under the direction of Saint Peter of Verona, O.P., this small group adopted a religious habit similar to the Dominican habit, choosing to live under the Rule of St. Augustine and adopting the name of the Servants of Mary. The new Order took a form more like that of the mendicant friars than that of the older monastic Orders.

Members of the community came to the United States from Austria in 1852 and settled in New York and later in Philadelphia. The two American provinces developed from the foundation made by Father Austin Morini in 1870 in Wisconsin. Community members combined monastic life and active ministry. In the monastery, they led a life of prayer, work and silence while in the active apostolate they engaged in parochial work, teaching, preaching, and other ministerial activities.



Fasting and Abstinence during Lent


In 2026, Catholic Lenten fasting and abstinence rules require Catholics aged 18–59 to fast (one full meal, two smaller meals) on Ash Wednesday (Feb. 18) and Good Friday (Apr. 3). Abstinence from meat is required for those 14+ on Ash Wednesday, Good Friday, and all Fridays in Lent.

Key Rules for Lenten Fasting and Abstinence:

- Abstinence (Meat):** Obligatory for everyone 14 years and older on Ash Wednesday, Good Friday, and all Fridays during Lent. This means no meat (beef, chicken, pork), though fish and shellfish are permitted.
- Fasting (Food Intake):** Obligatory for those 18–59 years old on Ash Wednesday and Good Friday. The rule allows for one full meal and two smaller non-meat meals that together do not equal a full meal.
- Voluntary Observance:** While only two days of fasting are required, Catholics are encouraged to continue voluntary fasting, prayer, and almsgiving throughout the 40 days of Lent.

Exceptions: People with health conditions, such as pregnancy, illness, or manual labor, are excused from the strict fasting rules.

Please bring your old blessed palms to church before Tuesday, February 17, to be burned for Ash Wednesday.

Saint Claude de la Colombière (February 15)

This is a special day for the Jesuits, who claim today's saint as one of their own. It's also a special day for people who have a special devotion to the Sacred Heart of Jesus—a devotion Saint Claude de la Colombière promoted along with his friend and spiritual companion, Saint Margaret Mary Alacoque. The emphasis on God's love for all was an antidote to the rigorous moralism of the Jansenists, who were popular at the time.

Saint Claude showed remarkable preaching skills long before his ordination in 1675. Two months later, he was made superior of a small Jesuit residence in Burgundy. It was there he first encountered Margaret Mary Alacoque. For many years after he served as her confessor.

He was next sent to England to serve as confessor to the Duchess of York. He preached by both words and by the example of his holy life, converting a number of Protestants. Tensions arose against Catholics and Claude, rumored to be part of a plot against the king, was imprisoned. He was ultimately banished, but by then his health had been ruined.

He died in 1682. Pope John Paul II canonized Saint Claude de la Colombière in 1992.

CRS Rice Bowl Lenten Story of Hope: Week One

February 26, 2024

Adolf and his wife, Florence, are farmers in Uganda. The couple is fighting hunger so that their family and others in their community can build thriving lives. They do this by farming, which helps their family to eat three nutritious meals a day, and by assisting others in their community to grow successful crops. Each member of their household has an important role, like gardening, cleaning, preparing meals and caring for the animals. In the evenings, they enjoy spending time together as a family. Adolf is thankful for the free time to sit and relax with his children.

In the area where they live, the climate is very dry. Lately, the rainy season has been coming later than it used to. And sometimes, it rains too much all at once and causes flooding. "It rains so heavily and destroys things," Adolf says. "So, the goodness of rain is taken away." In addition, people come through their community and steal their food or tools. It makes it difficult to farm with these challenges—and that means food is harder to come by.

To overcome these obstacles, Adolf and Florence joined a Catholic Relief Services program where they learned new farming methods that help them grow crops even when it is hot and dry. They planted seeds that grow quickly, so that they can still have vegetables to harvest, even if there isn't much rain. This provides enough food to eat and to sell at the market for extra income. Adolf says "I have seen my children are happy because they are well fed." Because of the successful life that he and Florence built, they are sharing the knowledge they learned with their neighbors. As leaders in their community, they work with others to increase their harvests, improve the land and build a safe and thriving community.
